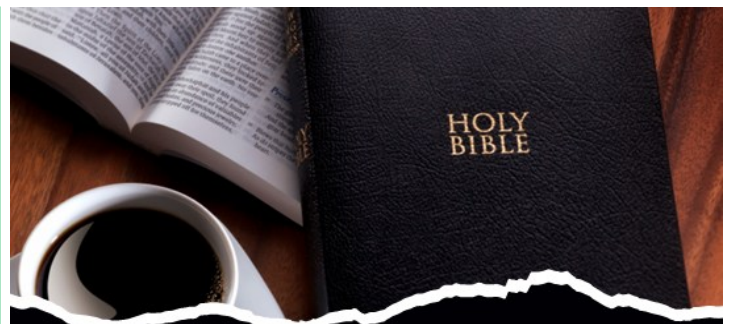

PASTOR'S PIECE

XXIII Sunday of Ordinary Time – September 6, 2026

The United States established Labor Day so that we wouldn't have May Day in our nation. The recent movement to celebrate May Day in certain cities and school systems is advocacy of Communism.

Communist ideology has no room for belief in God. It believes that the State must be the highest good to serve. Individuals are seen as a collection of parts to serve the State. On the contrary, we believe in the individual as a reflection of God's image and likeness. He is a sovereign entity with God-given rights of freedom which enable him to legitimately exercise dominion over the earth. "Be fertile and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it. Have dominion over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air, and all the living things that move on the earth." (Gen 1:28) His God-given mandate makes him a collaborator with the Creator in managing the affairs of earth and procreating. Such duties include the right to own property. The Church rejects any system of governance that undermines this obligation.

To exercise our mandate from Eden, mankind has a right to own and possess things. Nevertheless, this right is not absolute. The goods of creation are destined for the whole human race. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches, "The ownership of any property makes its holder a steward of Providence, with the task of making it fruitful and communicating its benefits to others, first of all his family." (CCC 2404)

This means that the world is served better by individuals having control of the world's goods over and above collective entities. We are commanded individually to serve the principles of justice and charity in the care of earthly goods and the fruits of men's labor. Stealing, as Communism advocates, is unjustly taking or keeping the goods of one's neighbor; usurping another's property against the reasonable will of the owner.

This isn't to say that Capitalism is hunky-dory. Our Catechism teaches, "Any system in which social relationships are determined entirely by economic factors is contrary to the nature of the human person and his acts." (CCC 2423) We don't believe that the market is sovereign, but rather it is the servant and tool of human beings who answer to principles of justice and charity. Like "a system that subordinates the basic rights of individuals and of groups to the collective organization of production

is contrary to human dignity ..." the Church "has likewise refused to accept, in the practice of 'capitalism', individualism and the absolute primacy of the law of the marketplace over human labor." (CCC 2423)

We're still in charge and this is what setting aside a day to honor the wage-laborer in our nation on Labor Day is all about. It is an expression of appreciation for those who work for a living. As our Catechism teaches, "Work is for man, not man for work." (CCC 2428) The pause is designed to give us a new perspective. Like the Lord's Day rest, our three-day weekend is a radical declaration that we are much more than the sum-total of our parts and labor, or whatever value somebody else places us. In short, we are human *beings* not human *doings*. Our existence is our glory. We are created in God's image and likeness. Our existence is good enough to demand rights and respect. In this divine image we were given work.

It is interesting to note that from the beginning we were working. That is, it was part of Paradise. As co-creators with God we are called to manage creation. We recall that in Genesis, Adam was to have dominion over the earth. He was given the task of naming the plants and animals. Eve was brought into this effort as his helpmate. This divine appointment wasn't negated by the Original Sin, but the first sin did make work the burden that we dread at times today. "By the sweat of your brow you shall toil for the bread you eat." (Gen 3:19) Because of sin, the difficulty of labor and our tendency to get ensnared with the things of this world, we take a day off. Like Sundays, it is intended to be a strike. It is a reminder to our society of the human being's value beyond whatever physical contributions he lends society.

We do not believe that the collective power of the worker is the source of sovereignty. Such rhetoric is a Communist pretense disguising the heavy hand of centralized power. Under name of the people, it ends up serving the desires of an oligarchy. For us the rights of the individual are the bedrock. The State must acknowledge and serve these God-given rights because they existed before society began to construct itself.

El Mensaje del Párroco

XXIII domingo del Tiempo Ordinario – 6 de septiembre, 2026

Los Estados Unidos estableció el Día del Trabajo para evitar la celebración del Primero de Mayo en la nación. El reciente movimiento para celebrar el Primero de Mayo en ciertas ciudades y sistemas escolares es una defensa del comunismo.

La ideología comunista no contempla la creencia en Dios. Sostiene que el Estado debe ser el bien supremo al que servir. Los individuos son vistos como un conjunto de partes al servicio del Estado. Por el contrario, creemos en el individuo como reflejo de la imagen y semejanza de Dios. Es una entidad soberana con derechos de libertad otorgados por Dios que le permiten ejercer legítimamente dominio sobre la tierra. “Sean fecundos y multiplíquense; llenen la tierra y sométanla. Dominen sobre los peces del mar, las aves del cielo y todos los seres vivientes que se mueven sobre la tierra” (Génesis 1:28). Su mandato divino lo convierte en colaborador del Creador en la administración de los asuntos de la tierra y la procreación. Entre tales deberes se incluye el derecho a la propiedad. La Iglesia rechaza cualquier sistema de gobierno que menoscabe esta obligación.

Para cumplir con el mandato que nos fue otorgado en el Edén, la humanidad tiene derecho a poseer cosas. Sin embargo, este derecho no es absoluto. Los bienes de la creación están destinados a toda la raza humana. La Catequismo de la Iglesia Católica enseña, “La propiedad de un bien hace de su dueño un administrador de la providencia para hacerlo fructificar y comunicar sus beneficios a otros, ante todo a sus próximos.” (CIC 2404)

Esto significa que el mundo se beneficia más cuando los individuos controlan los bienes del mundo por encima de las entidades colectivas. Individualmente, se nos ordena servir a los principios de justicia y caridad en el cuidado de los bienes terrenales y los frutos del trabajo humano. El robo, como lo defiende el comunismo, consiste en tomar o retener injustamente los bienes del prójimo; usurpar la propiedad ajena contra la voluntad razonable del dueño.

Esto no quiere decir que el capitalismo sea perfecto. Nuestro Catecismo enseña: “Todo sistema según el cual las relaciones sociales deben estar determinadas enteramente por los factores económicos, resulta contrario a la naturaleza de la persona humana y de sus actos” (CIC 2423). No creemos que el mercado sea soberano, sino más

bien un instrumento al servicio de los seres humanos, quienes responden a los principios de justicia y caridad. Así como “Un sistema que ‘sacrifica los derechos fundamentales de la persona y de los grupos en aras de la organización colectiva de la producción’ es contrario a la dignidad del hombre.” La Iglesia sigue, “Una teoría que hace del lucro la norma exclusiva y el fin último de la actividad económica es moralmente inaceptable” (CIC 2424).

Todavía estamos a cargo y de eso se trata reservar un día para honrar al trabajador asalariado en nuestra nación en el Día del Trabajo. Es una expresión de agradecimiento hacia quienes trabajan para ganarse la vida. Como enseña nuestro Catecismo: “El trabajo es para el hombre, no el hombre para el trabajo”. (CIC 2428) La pausa está diseñada para darnos una nueva perspectiva. Al igual que el descanso del Día del Señor, nuestro fin de semana de tres días es una declaración radical de que somos mucho más que la suma total de nuestras partes y trabajo, o cualquier valor que alguien más nos atribuya. En resumen, somos seres humanos, no hechos humanos. Nuestra existencia es nuestra gloria. Somos creados a imagen y semejanza de Dios. Nuestra existencia es lo suficientemente buena como para exigir derechos y respeto. En esta imagen divina se nos dio trabajo.

Es interesante notar que desde el principio estuvimos trabajando. Es decir, era parte del Paraíso. Como cocreadores con Dios estamos llamados a gestionar la creación. Recordamos que en Génesis Adán debía tener dominio sobre la tierra. Se le asignó la tarea de nombrar las plantas y los animales. Eva participó en este esfuerzo como su ayudante. Este nombramiento divino no fue negado por el pecado original, pero el primer pecado hizo que el trabajo fuera la carga que a veces tememos hoy. “Con el sudor de tu frente trabajarás para conseguir el pan que comes”. (Gén 3:19)

No creemos que el poder colectivo del trabajador sea la fuente de la soberanía. Tal retórica es una farsa comunista que disfraza la mano dura del poder centralizado. Bajo el nombre del pueblo, termina sirviendo a los deseos de una oligarquía. Para nosotros, los derechos del individuo son la base. El Estado debe reconocer y proteger estos derechos divinos, pues existían antes de que la sociedad comenzara a construirse.

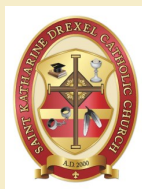
